About the MLK Celebration

UNC's MLK Jr. Celebration is part of a campus-wide initiative to honor Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., his legacy, and his ideals. Carolina began its celebrations of Dr. King's life and legacy in 1983, long before there was a federal holiday. UNC is the only university ever awarded the "Making of the King Holiday Award" by the former MLK Federal Holiday Commission. UNC-CH engages in honoring King's legacy through several efforts: MLK Celebration and Committee; MLK University and Community Corporation; and the UNC MLK Scholarship Program for UNC juniors. The MLK Celebration is under the direction of Diversity and Multicultural Affairs and is developed by the University MLK Celebration Committee of student leaders and faculty and staff advisers.

About the MLK Theme, "Unifying the Dream"

This year's theme, "Unifying the Dream through Thought and Action," aligns with UNC-CH's mission to foster research, scholarship, and creativity and reflects working together in advancing scholarship, promoting social justice, leading change, and transforming the world.

In the spirit of unity, the organizations and offices that make up the University MLK Celebration Committee committed to collaborating on projects and programs in an effort to enrich the MLK Celebration experience for the campus and surrounding community.

Keynote Speaker: Hill Harper

Accomplished film, television, and stage actor Hill Harper in the CBS series CSI: New York. His other television credits include appearances on two CBS series: The Handler and City of Angels. He has also had guest-starring roles on such programs as Showtime's Soul Food and HBO's The Sopranos.

Hill Harper is committed to helping the youth of America achieve their dreams and live their lives positively. The author of the New York Times best seller and American Library Association Award-winner for "Best Book for Youth and Teens," Letters to a Young Brother: Manifest Your Destiny, he has dedicated himself to empowering, encouraging, and inspiring America's underserved communities. His Manifest Your Destiny Foundation is a mentorship program which helps young men and women follow their career paths through a motivational support system. His most recent book, Letters to an Incarcerated Brother was released in November 2013.

Hill Harper is also the author of Letters to a Young Sister: Define Your Destiny, and The Conversation: How Black Men and Women Can Build Loving, Trusting Relationships.
